# **Texas High School Athletic Directors Association**

## **Executive Director's Report** Rusty Dowling, Executive Director – THSADA

"The Texas High School Athletic Directors Association welcomes everyone to the 82nd annual THSCA Coaching School here in San Antonio, Texas. The THSADA appreciates its involvement with the Texas High School Coaches Association and our participation in the Coaching School program. This particular Coaching School is significant as the new leadership model that was approved by the THSADA Board of Directors last year becomes effective at the THSADA General Session. The THSADA Region map was reconfigured with all eight regions now having their own regional director and an active membership election for the new THSADA Vice President who will assume office at the General Session.

This past year has been a very busy and involved year for the Texas High School Athletic Directors Association. At last year's Coaching School, the THSADA introduced a new leadership model along with those bylaws that support their structure. The THSADA presented Professional Development during Coaching School that was provided by both member Athletic Directors and UIL Staff. A new board orientation was held that essentially outline the duties and responsibilities of all board members and officers.

A new online membership registration was introduced starting on November 1st, 2013 and running through the end of May, 2014. Responses by both current and new members was excellent as we far exceeded our membership goal by reaching well over 550. This upcoming year we start again on November 1st, 2014.

The monthly Region meetings are very critical for the THSADA as it is a regular way to disseminate information to the membership and take care of the regular business of the Association. The organization and administration of the Home Team Marketing-THSADA State Conference is a year round endeavor and the most high profile event that the THSADA sponsors. It is also the single-most important event that the THSADA does regarding revenue generating and membership involvement. ### Getting to Know: Traci Neely Assistant Athletic Director for the UIL

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Why did you add a wheelchair division?

This was a UIL state competition consideration and discussion in many of the last several years because many of our schools have students with disabilities in their populations. We were able to fold the Paralympic events into the state track meet schedule quite easily with the cooperation of the UT Mike Myers operations staff after consulting with the USOC Paralympic staff.

#### How many participants did you have this year?

10 total with four girls and six boys.

#### Were most parts of the state represented?

Close, with the exception of the Rio Grande Valley. Schools represented were Rockdale, Cleburne, Cibolo Steele, Pampa, Garland Rowlett, Comal Canyon, Fort Bend Elkins, Dumas, San Antonio Reagan and Amarillo River Road.

#### Were the 100M, 400M and shot put events considered a success and why?

Yes, because we had enough participants to compete in both the boys and girls divisions in all six events. We are able to medal participants with gold, silver and bronze in five of the six events. The boys shot put only had two competitors so we medaled first and second place.

# Does the UIL expect growth in this

Yes, the conversations with school administration and coaches has been very positive and the regional events are becoming more of a part of the conversations. The initial thoughts are for some of the district meets to host these events, as well, and the idea will spread from there quickly.

#### With the projected growth, is the UIL considering other events at the State Meet?

We would consider the additional Paralympic events at the request of the schools with participants that could be interested in different events than we currently have offered.

#### Anything you would like to add about the Wheelchair Division and the UIL?

The UIL State Track Meet is the largest state championship event we host regarding participation numbers. The track meet had over 850 boys and girls school teams with nearly 4,000 students represented in six conferences from four regions. The wheelchair division added three events for both boys and girls - which created the additional time in order to offer the students with disabilities this opportunity, but the volunteers and officials embraced these events with a great deal of enthusiasm. The crowds openly gave the participants a warm reception with the standing ovation of history making! ★

Tramesha Hardy has earned three varsity letters in volleyball and four varsity letters in track at King High School. She was named to the 19-4A All-District Volleyball Team in 2013 and earned Academic All-District honors in 2012 and 2013.

In 2012, Tramesha qualified for the State Track Meet as part of the King High School  $4 \times 400$  M Relay Team. In 2013, she qualified for the State Meet in the 100 M Dash and was part of the  $4 \times 200$  M Relay Team, which finished in 2nd place. In 2014, Tramesha was crowned the 100 M Dash Champion at the State Meet and anchored the  $4 \times 200$  M Relay Team, which finished 4th.

Tramesha has been nominated for the TGCA All-Star and All-State Teams. The members of those teams have not been released by the TGCA yet.

Tramesha has signed a letter of intent to run track for Alcorn State after she graduates.



### Ray Lu - Westwood High School - Round Rock ISD

Ray Lu has demonstrated a great capacity for work on the field and in the classroom during his time at Westwood High School. He was named Special Team Player of the Week for Week 5 in 2013. Ray was a National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame Scholar Athlete Nominee.

Ray has maintained a 4.0 GPA and is ranked 23rd out of the 587 members of his class. Ray earned his International Baccalaureate Diploma. He was the president of the National Honor Society at Westwood High School and a member of the National French Honor Society.

Ray also volunteers at the Austin Capital Area Food Bank.

Ray scored a perfect score on his SAT and ACT tests and is attending Dartmouth College in the fall.


